#### DRINK DRIVE LIMIT:

The Association of Police and Crime Commissioners' is backing the British Medical Association's (BMA) call for a lower drink drive limit. England, Wales, and Northern Ireland currently have the highest legal BAC (blood alcohol content) limit for driving in Europe, at 80mg of alcohol per 100ml of blood. The Scottish limit was lowered to 50mg of alcohol per 100ml of blood in December 2014.

Driving under the influence of both legal and illegal drugs is an issue that is growing on all measures in the UK - collisions and casualties have gone up by over 260% during the last ten years, and convictions are increasing every year.

### John Ware Testimonial

I have been driving for many years and had been thinking that I would like to take the IAM Advanced Driver course for some time (a few years!).

During the Covid pandemic my wife didn't drive for some time and had become a bit nervous when she started driving again. I saw on the IAM RoadSmart website that they were advertising a Mature Driver Review session and bought this for her as a present. She enjoyed the experience, and it went a long way towards restoring her confidence. I went along for the ride, and at the end of the session after the very constructive feedback, the IAM expert was talking about further possible courses which made me think again about doing something myself.

I saw that IAM RoadSmart were offering a "Free Taster" drive, so I booked myself on one of these, which I found to be a very positive and enjoyable experience. This convinced me to go ahead and book the Advanced Driver course.

I was notified of my Observer for the course which was the same person (Graham Watson) as for the taster drive which gave continuity to the process. I found that the critique after each of the observed drives was always constructive, thus enabling improvement where required. After six observed drives spread over two months my Observer considered that I was "test ready", and organised for me to have a "check drive" with a different Observer (Terry Vincent) to confirm this. This went well and a test date was requested, which unfortunately was not until six weeks after the "check drive". Graham therefore suggested that it would be a good idea if he took me on another couple of observed drives to "keep me on the boil!" (...and I quote!!) until my test date. So, this is what I did, meaning I had eight observed drives with Graham prior to my test.

My test was carried out by examiner Neale McConnell on a route starting from Beccles, which is some 25 miles from where I live, on roads unfamiliar to me. We met at a café with a large car park, introduced ourselves, and went from there. The test was conducted in a friendly and relaxed manner putting me at ease throughout. The whole test lasted about an hour. When we finished, and I was told that I had passed and achieved a "First", I was delighted.

I would say to anyone thinking about taking the IAM Advanced Driver course – get in touch and do it! In terms of driving skills you can't lose, and it is also excellent value for money!

The Secretary wondered how many members used social media (Facebook, Instagram). The use of these would strengthen our presence which was particularly important in attracting younger people.

We have 78 on line Wheels magazine subscribers. The production of Wheels and postage is a major expense so if any other members would like to opt out of receiving a paper copy of Wheels in the post, please contact the Treasurer.

The monthly social evenings were well attended, but the organiser of speakers for these events has moved to a different post on the Committee. While the Committee will endeavour to source future speakers, it will be an extra load on already busy people so a new Committee member to take on this post will be most welcome.

There is also a need for someone to help with the admin for the MDU. Again, the existing Committee members will cover this, but help would be appreciated.

Our bike section thrives and has a good selection of rideouts twice a month. Car members are welcome to join us if they like the sound of one of our destinations, probably meeting us there. If you would like to come with us please contact me or the Secretary. The post of Rideout Organiser is also vacant, so this is a job that I'm covering.

There are two trophies that the Group can award annually. The Merit Plate is awarded to the non-Committee member who has done the most in helping and promoting the Group throughout the year. Nominations for this award can be from any member of the Group. The Norman Parker Cup is awarded to the winner of any motoring competition we might hold. Neither has been awarded this year.

And finally. I travelled to the AGM in Paul Southwell's new Transit van. Apart from car like comfort and startling performance, Paul has an app that allows him to start the engine remotely without unlocking the doors. ### **TOURING IN IRELAND**



In 1978 I was single, living and working in Banbury, and the owner of a 500cc Triumph Tiger 100. The longest journey I made on the Triumph was when wanting a holiday after ending a relationship, I visited the Irish Republic. I took the ferry from Fishguard to Rosslare, then, finding B&Bs as I went, made a circular tour over the course of a week from Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> September, when I left home at 9pm. I had (according to my diary) a lousy wet ride to Fishguard, arriving at 2am on 11<sup>th</sup> to catch the ferry across.

Monday 11<sup>th</sup> was a fine and windy day. I rode the coast road from Wexford to Cork. That night I stayed in Blarney, having stopped in Cork for pizza and a walk and visited the Waterford Crystal factory for a tour. On Tuesday I walked around Blarney village and visited the castle on foot, looked at the Blarney Stone but didn't kiss it and then rode to Limerick for a look around a pleasant city.



Then on to Galway, which I loved, and where I walked around the bay despite the cold and wind.

Wednesday 13th it lashed with rain all day, so I rode the coast road round Connemara, on to Westport and beyond. I was soaked, so stayed at a farm near Castlereagh, which was lovely, with good company, and lots of enjoyable conversation. Thursday, I spent the morning riding to Dublin, and the afternoon getting out! I didn't enjoy it, saw little or nothing



of the city, and the bike and the rider both overheated! I escaped next to the haven of Wicklow, where I parked the bike, and apparently, from the diary entry, walked, climbed, and dreamed, as it was almost the end of my stay.



I spent the morning of Friday 15<sup>th</sup> in Wicklow, and later rode to Wexford, where I parked up and spent the afternoon and evening of a warm sunny day walking around and relaxing.

Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> I rode to the ferry port at Rosslare and caught the ferry back to Fishguard. However, as I left the final guest house, I couldn't start the engine, but fortunately the house was on a steep hill and I was able to bump start. On arrival back at port in Fishguard, I had the same experience on the exit ramp from the ferry, which fortunately also sloped down fairly steeply, so again I was able to bump start it. As the bike continued spitting and stalling, and because of the challenges of the morning, I then made the entire return trip to Banbury non-stop. Unfortunately, the bike never started again but as I had procured a new job which came with a company car, I reluctantly sold the Triumph – albeit at a profit!



It was some years before I rode again, but eventually, two jobs later and being out of work and apparently unemployable as a 43 year old female, I began an assortment of different part time jobs over several years, from interviewing passengers at Heathrow to becoming a driving instructor (cars only!). As I then had some time on my hands, I used to drive up to a Honda dealer in Ruislip and hire a bike for the day, loving every minute of my assorted excursions exploring around the south of England. Close to my Thames Valley home a Harley Davidson dealer opened, and I went in a few times to ask whether they hired bikes by the day, eventually receiving the right answer, so I began to hire from there instead, and enjoyed many more outings, including observed runs resulting in my Institute of Advanced Motorists motorcycle membership, achieved in 1995, five years after my car advanced test pass.

The Chairman welcomed all members to the 59th AGM of the Group. The Secretary had received apologies from Pam Medlock, Tim Clelland, Peter Webb, Pamela Austin, June Stubbert, Ted Clements, and Kevin Smith.

The minutes of the 2024 AGM were briefed and approved by the meeting.

Clyde Brown and Dave Cusdin have recently stood down from Observer and Rideout co-ordinator roles and the Chairman thanked them for their support to the Group. He also thanked the Committee and all the Observers.

This had been a good year for new members, 3 new full members (1 car 2 bike), 21 new car associates and 8 new bike associates. There had been 9 car test passes, including 2 firsts, and 5 bike passes.

We are in a better position now with car Observers and are well on the way to having all Observers to the required National Standard.

There was disappointment at the lack of interest shown by members in the various events that had been organised by the Committee beyond the usual monthly social evenings. For the next year, only social evenings will be organised. Bob Tash, the social events organiser, is standing down from this role and was thanked for the hard work he has put into it.

The MDU has had a busy year going to 8 events across the county, the Chairman thanked Keith Mace for the amount of time and effort he has put into this.

The Chairman thanked Vernon Clarke for editing our exceptional Wheels magazine, and Steve Palmer for maintaining our website, one of the best of any IAM group.

There are currently 3 vacancies on the Committee, the speaker co-ordinator, rideout co-ordinator, and MDU admin assistant. The Chairman urged members to consider volunteering to fill these posts as he thought it was unfair to expect other Committee members to cover them.

The Secretary also welcomed all members and gave a comprehensive report. Our membership is steady, the extra £3.00 increase in membership fees is acceptable given we hadn't needed to make an increase in over 10 years.

Secretary reported we currently have 11 car observers and 3 bike observers.

The Treasurer had produced a copy of the accounts for every attendee showing that we are in a healthier position than this time last year. Magazine costs and postage are still our biggest expense but we are still showing a healthy bank balance.

The three officers on the Committee, Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer were all willing to stand again and were voted in unanimously.

Most of the remaining Committee were also willing to stand again and were voted in with no objections. The Committee list is inside the front cover of this magazine. There are now three vacancies on the Committee so any volunteers to fill them would be appreciated.

There were no nominations for the Merit Plate, and there had been no competition for the Norman Parker Trophy.

The meeting was closed at 19:55pm. The 60th AGM will be held 14<sup>th</sup> Jan 2026.



As you will be aware from the AGM I have retired from this role having carried it out for over five years it is time to give someone else a chance. I have taken over the role of Associate Coordinator from Lara so will be concentrating on that from now on.

It will soon be time to start preparing for another season with the Mobile Display Unit (MDU). In times past we have taken the "unit" to an average of twelve events per year, but since the pandemic, many of those events have permanently closed, so we are left with a core of about six and need more. The problem is that the Norwich & Norfolk Group has a large geographical area to cover and most of our events are in the central part of that area so we are not covering as much of it as we would like.

This is one of the reasons I am looking for an administrator for the MDU. While I am happy to move it around and set it up, each event has to be booked and staffed, and although that is not an onerous task it does take time, but also I need someone who can follow up on new locations or events that we can attend. We want to get around the whole area we cover as much as possible, but have to take account of pitch fees, cost of hauling the thing there and back and whether the event is likely to be cost effective. So there are limitations to consider but if anyone is interested we can go into detail later.


GROUP MEETINGS

#### From Norwich :

From the Ring road take the Newmarket road out of Norwich. Take the slip road down to Eaton. Over the traffic lights, follow the old Newmarket Road (From Bluebell Road turn right at the lights). Over the bridge, take the first left (Intwood Road), in about 280yds turn left (Oaklands Road) and down to the end. Turn left to the Pavilion car park.

#### From the A47 :

Take the A11 towards Norwich. Just before the flyover take the slip road signposted Cringleford. At the 'T' junction turn right over the flyover. Turn left at the next 'T' junction and folloow the road round a slight right then slight left. Take the first right - acute right (Intwood Road), in about 280yds turn left (Oaklands Road), down to the end and turn left to the Pavilion car park.

#### 26<sup>th</sup> January - Walkers Cafe, Barton Mills

Our ride on the 26th January was to Walker's Snacks by the Five Ways Roundabout at Barton Mills. 8 riders turned out including Soji, former Chairman of the Group and now our local IAM car and bike examiner. He's not joined us for a while so it was nice to see him.

It was a bit of a shock to find the Sainsbury's car park where we meet full of VW vans of varying ages and types, along with a few VW cars. They were obviously meeting here before going on to another event and all set off to leave at about the same time that we did. It was chaos, vans everywhere trying to get out of the car park. We had to be careful joining this exodus, but luckily once out of the car park they went in a different direction to us.

It's not a long ride from King's Lynn to Barton Mills, about an hour, and although it was chilly the roads had largely dried out. It was a pleasant ride, long enough to be worth doing but not long enough to become really cold. Heated grips and clothing were appreciated by some though.
