All our seven Observers are fully committed with Associates on Full Course Training or Free Tasters. We did have eight Observers until recently but one has had to stand down due to health issues, hopefully temporarily. We desperately need more qualified Observers to keep up with the demand. A message we have put out before.

Geographically we have black spots such as North Norfolk and West Norfolk where Observers are thin on the ground. We always try to pair up a new Associate with an Observer as close as possible to minimise travel costs and time.

Observer Locations: -

Kings Lynn – 1; Swaffham – 1; Norwich area – 2; Thetford – 1; Dereham – 1; Diss - 1

I am now in the position of having a substantial waiting list and am therefore asking new recruits how far they are willing to travel to meet up with an Observer. I fear that if someone is on the waiting list too long, they will lose interest!

The Free Tasters, an initiative by IAM, have proved popular and involves just a one-off session with an Observer to provide, as the name suggests, a taste of what an Advanced Driving Course would be like and also to assess the applicant's driving ability. I am reluctant to turn any requests down as a Free Taster can often lead to signing up for a full course. However, with the limited number of Observers at present this is just another addition to the load.

We are also often asked to carry out a 'Check Drive' on already qualified Members who feel like they need an assessment of the current quality of their driving skills after having qualified some years ago. We would certainly like to oblige by carrying these out for any current and paid-up members but at present it is not possible because of the work load.

All Committee members are trying their best to recruit, persuade, cajole etc any suitable Advanced Drivers to take the training to become a National Observer.

So, if any of you Members out there are interested, please let us know and we can arrange for you to be trained up and take on this very rewarding role.

There has been some discussion recently about the brightness of LED headlights on cars. I was riding home in the rain from the September Group meeting and was dazzled more than usual by oncoming traffic. It occurred to me that many modern cars have an automatic main beam function, and perhaps whatever controls this wasn't "seeing" me on my bike. Something to think about if your car has this function.

I attended an IAM "Network and Knowledge" event (these used to be called regional forums) on the 27th September, and the IAM staff there gave details of what the future holds. Here's a brief roundup:

There will be instructional videos on the IAM website on various aspects of safer driving and riding.

It is intended to put an Associate's run sheets onto part of the DARTS portal where they will be filled in by their Observer. These run sheets will only be accessible to the Associate, their Observer, and the Group Chief Observer. This system is being trialled by a number of groups with a plan to roll it out over the next year.

There are about 68,500 current IAM members, 40% aged 50 to 69 and 32% aged over 70. On average 55% of members renew their membership each year. About 58% of members are car drivers, 25% motorcyclists, and 6% both car and

The IAM intends to try and raise money like any other charity by voluntary contributions and intends to launch a lottery in 2026!

A new IAM website was launched in October, so expect more information for members to be digital.

We have a new Area Delivery Manager, Carl Sturman, who is our link with IAM head office. He will be at our AGM in January so if you have any questions about the IAM, he's the man to speak to.

And finally, for those who enjoy podcasts, look out for one called "Where's my Flying Car?" which apparently has a road safety theme to it.

What You missed

A full house listened intently to the talk by Sarah Taylor, our Police and Crime Commissioner for Norfolk.

She has a strong Civil Engineering background which involved analysing crashes (not for the Police) when there had been a fatality; reporting on improvements and what can be done to stop crashes happening again in the same area. Sarah would then report to the families concerned and to the Government, working with councils and National highways rectifying accident blackspots to make roads safer.

As she says, it is the way that people use the roads. It's not the speed itself that kills, it's the weakness of the human body. Sarah's stated aim during her time as Police and Crime Commissioner is to improve policing across Norfolk as a whole. We need to restart Norfolk's Road Safety Partnership and provide safer roads which could be via changing speed limits or working with the Speed Camera Partnership. Norfolk has its own HGV camera unit. Sarah says she wants to prioritise the reduction of serious violence and crime, bringing more offenders to justice. Sarah has done many visits across Norfolk listening to people's

concerns, with pop-up surgeries in supermarkets and libraries, schools and colleges, and attending community events such as the Royal Norfolk show, Norwich Pride and Cromer Carnival.

Sarah answered many questions from the audience, one being a long debate on E-scooters.

On the 8th October Mike Ford gave us an insight into the world of land speed records and the Bloodhound SSC.

We started the evening with the intro of Thunderbirds from the 60's TV program; jolting the memories.

As Mike pointed out the world today is all about technology. He is an Engineer and has worked in Science, Technology, Art, Mathematics, including Lawrence Scott & Electromotors in Norwich. He then moved on to Cunard, the shipping company, where he was told to redesign a container ship into an aircraft carrier in just nine days for the Falklands War. Mike also worked for a National Shipping Company in Saudi Arabia, the Nuclear Power industry and the food industry as an engineering director at Campbells Soup in Kings Lynn. He now has his own consultancy business.

If you see bloodhound in a museum it's likely to be one of three mock-ups. Land speed records started in 1883 with a French car which happened to be electric. Some of the land speed rules are: The car has to have four wheels which must be in contact with the ground. The car must be able to turn round and drive back to the start to comply.

In 1997 Richard Noble built a special car and reached 763mph. The Bloodhound SSC will cover one mile in 3.6 seconds and 0 - 1000mph in 59 seconds helped by the addition of a Hybrid Rocket costing between £10 - 12M to develop.

The cockpit and nose cone area are made from super strong carbon fibre except the very tip being made from 3D printed Titanium. The steering wheel is also of 3D printed Titanium and costing around £25K. The wheels spin at 170times per second, are made of solid Aluminium and forged using a 20,000 tonne press.

New editions of *Roadcraft: The Police Driver's Handbook* and *Motorcycle Roadcraft: The Police Rider's Handbook* have recently been published. These latest editions, the first in five years, reflect modern vehicles, evolving technology and the most up-to-date, evidence-based practice. New chapters on advanced driver and rider-assistance systems describe common assistance features. There are also new high-quality photographs, diagrams, and illustrations.

The Group has indicated its intention to provide observers with the new edition, so you may not need to rush out and buy one just yet. Those of you who have the *Roadcraft* app should receive the latest updates free of charge.

Another change that directly affects our team of observers is the Group's intention to create the roll of Chief Observer at the forthcoming AGM. This role will replace the role of observer training coordinator and will align the Group with the IAM's Group Handbook. There will, in fact, be two Chief Observers, one for cars and one for bikes. I'm delighted to be able to say that we already have an observer who has expressed an interest in taking on the role of car Chief Observer and who will stand for election at the next AGM.

I'd finally like to thank you for all your outstanding work and commitment in training our associates. We have been fortunate to have recently experienced an increase in the number of associates joining our Group and many of you have taken on a significant increase in workload. I'm particularly impressed that the quality of training has been maintained, which is evidenced by the excellent results being achieved. If you have any associates that you think would make a great observer, please encourage them to apply. I'm sure they'd find it as enjoyable and rewarding as we all do.

NEW VISION TEST FOR DRIVERS

The government has given an update on calls to introduce new vision tests for drivers and if the suggestion were adopted all drivers applying for a driving licence renewal at 70 would have to get a recent eye test and submit it with their application.

Opticians have called for the over-70s to get tested after a study showed that a startling proportion had found six in 10 of its members have seen a patient who is driving illegally within the past month. It estimates a tenth of the more than 30 million British motorists may have sub-standard vision.

Vikki Slade MP submitted a written Parliamentary question on the issue asking the Secretary of State for Transport if she will make an assessment of the potential merits of:

- (a) requiring all drivers to submit a recent eye test result when applying for a driving license renewal and
- (b) broadening the required eye tests to include an assessment of
- (i) vision in reduced lighting, (ii) reaction times, and (iii) peripheral vision."

The Association of Optometrists last year called for the law to be changed so that all drivers have their vision checked when they first apply for a driving license, when renewing it, and every three years for those over seventy.

The Government is considering the current process of self-declaration and the challenges posed by an ageing population where certain conditions, including vision conditions, may become more prevalent. In the meantime, the current renewal at age 70 process remains as is, and drivers must legally declare any vision or medical conditions that may affect their ability to drive.



PARKING PAYMENT

According to the survey, 73% of drivers experienced at least one issue when trying to pay for parking via an app with the most common frustration, cited by 70% of respondents, being a lack of reliable mobile phone signal in car parks.

Other complaints included apps failing to recognise the correct location (36%), frequent app crashes (35%), and functionality issues such as error messages or payment failures (30%). A further 24% said the apps they were using did not accept their bank cards. In comparison, 13% admitted they struggled to understand how to use the apps at all — a figure that doubled to 26% among drivers aged 75 and over, highlighting a significant digital divide in parking accessibility.

The RAC's findings also reveal that drivers are juggling multiple parking apps just to get around with almost two-thirds (64%) of app users reporting that they have at least two parking apps on their phones, 36% said they use three and 15% said they currently have four or more apps installed.

When it comes to paying, 46% of drivers said they would rather use a bank card or contactless payment. Meanwhile, 33% still prefer cash, while just 30% opted for a mobile app as their preferred payment method. A smaller group, around 6%, said they like to pay via QR codes, but experts have warned this growing practice exposes drivers to "quishing" scams, in which fraudsters use fake QR codes to steal personal or banking data.

The RAC continues to urge parking operators to offer at least two payment methods, ensuring that those without smartphones or who struggle with technology are not unfairly penalised and no one should be forced to use an app to park if they don't want to.

Parham Airfield Museum is located on the site of of a former World War 2 USAF station at Parham in Suffolk, not far from Framlingham. It also houses the Museum of the British Resistance Organisation, the story of Britain's secret army of World War 2.

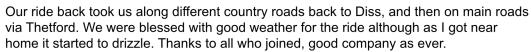

24th August - TTT Motorcycle Village

Seven confused and disappointed riders aggregate at the grocery superstore, their mood matching the unseasonably cool and grey weather. The cause of the dismay being that Stonham Barns is, rather selfishly, hosting a car show on the day of our scheduled visit. A stand-in destination in the same general area ('South') was nevertheless quickly choosen and spirits improved, along with the weather. This being the second rideout of the month, it is the longer of the two and as such a banana makes a great breakfast, being packed full of energy-giving carbohydrates and heart-healthy potassium, all released slowly into the system, aiding both physical stamina and concentration.

Divided into two groups, todays route takes us south through Norfolk, Suffolk and very briefly into Essex; the vast majority of the riding being on narrow, twisting B-roads - often bumpy, but rarely pot-holed. No time to appreciate the scenery, the road demands all of our attention.

TTT is a veritable Aladdin's Cave of motorcycling fantasy housed, invisible-in-plain-sight, in a nondescript (verging on decrepit) building, in a nondescript industrial estate (The Stour Valley Business Centre, 'Sudbury's premier business park') in a nondescript town. Yet walk inside - no password required - and be dazzled by the array of machinery before you, all available to buy if only you have the coins. Crammed together, leaky old AJS next to pristine Norton V4S, limited edition Ducati 916 next to smokey '70s two-strokes, battled-scarred track bikes next to bizarrely Harley-aping Yamaha cruiser chrome leviathan. 10th August - Old Buckenham Airfield
